I am delighted to see a good response to the event today which would discuss opportunities on the two sectors of Hospitality and Transport. With our continous engagement with Japan in the field of Skill development, I am happy to state that a new test for Hospitality (Accomodation) was recently conducted in India in February 2024. I also understand that the Transportation sector is one of the new sector introduced by Government of Japan as part of its expansion from 12 sectors to 16 under the SSW domain, and India has been touted as an important source country due to the similarity of the driving systems. 2. Friends, the Government of India is fast-tracking the entire Skill development ecosystem in India. It has announced setting up 30 Skill India International Centers (SIICs) in different states of India, which will be used for conducting various International level skilling initiatives for both domain and languages for Indian candidates. Presently 2 SIICs are already functions in Varanasi and Bhubaneswar. As many as 1.4 crore youth have been trained and up-skilled under the Skill India Mission. Wide-ranging skill gap analysis, enabled by technological interface is providing the necessary heft to the area of Skill Development.

3. travelled L have 43 prefectures the to and met Governors/Speakers and other authorities. There is an immense desire to recruit talented and Skilled workforce from India. With Japan, we have important mechanisms for the sending and receiving of Indian skilled workers both under the TITP and SSW. We have also concluded next-gen partnerships in mobility and migration with several countries, with focus on cooperation on skills and underexplored avenues for mobility, especially of professionals and students. As such, India is harnessing the power of its demographic dividend through government and private sector interventions to becoming a global supplier of skilled workforce.
